FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Covid-19: Whenever there are changes to the response, there is often confusion and misleading headlines. This link provides up-to-date guidance.

What are the school's expectations now?

Self-isolation: The legal requirement to self-isolate following a positive test has been removed but not the expectation. The school position will be to follow the guidance below:

"Adults and children who test positive will continue to be advised to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for at least 5 full days and then continue to follow the guidance until they have received 2 negative test results on consecutive days."

Symptoms: If a member of staff or a child has any of the main symptoms or a positive test result, the public health advice remains unchanged and is to stay at home and avoid contact with other people. Anyone with any of the main COVID-19 symptoms should order a test and is advised to stay at home while waiting for the result.

If they test positive, they are advised to follow public health advice.

Visit to Great St Mary's as part of our Religious Education Topic: This week two of our classes went to visit Great St Mary's Church. They walked from school, a distance which a few found rather daunting, but they all made it. They then spent time in the church finding out many things from Father Simon. He explained about the church calendar and that currently the altar cloth, the hymn books and a cross are green but will soon change to purple for Lent and Easter. They liked seeing the different clothing that he wears. They particularly liked seeing the censer in which incense was burned and the smoke was coming out. Father Simon explained that it symbolises our prayers rising to God.

Their current topic in RE includes prayer, reflection and stillness and they found out lots of information about prayer, including about the cushions to kneel on and a place in the church where you can light a candle and pray for friends and family.

They discovered that the church is open throughout the day for people to come in to sit and pray and that there is often calming music to help people relax and find stillness



MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH




Fr Simon writes:

The news from Ukraine is bleak and the condemnation from the west has been swift.

Religious leaders have also been quick to state their desire to see peace and justice prevail. In a joint statement yesterday morning, the archbishops of Canterbury and York said: "The horrific and unprovoked attack on Ukraine is an act of great evil. Placing our trust in Jesus

Christ, the author of peace, we pray for an urgent ceasefire and a withdrawal of Russian forces." Archbishop Justin has also invited Christians to "make this Sunday a day for prayer for Ukraine, Russia, and for peace", and has endorsed Pope Francis's call to make this coming Wednesday - Ash Wednesday - a global day of fasting and peace for Ukraine.



I fear many won't notice that the archbishops, the Pope, and other faith leaders have made comment - still actually care what they've said. There's a belief in our increasingly

secularised world that religion should stay out of politics. It keys into the notion that our faith should be private and not encroach upon the rest of our lives or - God forbid! - other people's lives. It also keys into the notion that church is just for Sundays.

But Jesus was highly political, telling the rich that, unlike the poor who were blessed, they would face woes. He also criticised King Herod by calling him a fox, and laid into both religious and other national leaders whom he deemed to be uncaring.

PRAY F R UKRAINE

Jesus didn't do this because he necessarily wanted to enter the political fray. He did it because God cares for those in need - those who are poor, those who are vulnerable, those who are being oppressed by another force. And God expects those who claim to act in his name to do the same: to care. And that means caring through actions and words.

Whether the words of faith leaders are heard or heeded as we look with astonishment at the situation in Ukraine, we must continue to draw on a Christian understanding of justice, generosity, and human dignity so as to help create a better world which reflects God's loving values.



The Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 Time Capsule and Tree planting

To honour HM the Queen's Platinum Jubilee in 2022 the Town Council will be burying a time capsule and planting a tree in Monastery Park.

The Town Council is calling for residents of Bishop's Stortford to supply a record of their memories' of the Queen's 70 year reign to be included in the capsule. The entries can be written text or stories, drawings, photographs, newspaper clippings or small physical items etc. The Council will also include items representing Bishop's Stortford in 2022 such as a map, newspaper etc.

All entries can be dropped off to the Tourist Information Centre either in person, via post or electronically via tic@bishopsstortford.org until 4pm on 22 June 2022 (this deadline has been extended from January 2022). Physical entries must be submitted with a donation form available from Town Council's website or at the Tourist Information Centre. For preservation all entries must be in polyethylene bags (a sandwich bag). Please not do include any entries with batteries, staples, paper clips, rubber bands, cling type films such as protective wrappers or any food products as this destroys preservation.

The time capsule will be buried and the tree will be planted on 2 July 2022 in Monastery Park, where there will be a ceremony with the Mayor. Members of the public are also invited to attend the ceremony and further details will be released soon.

The Tourist Information Centre is located at 2 Market Square Bishop's Stortford CM23 3UU and is open Monday to Saturday 9:30am-4pm, closed for lunch from 12:25pm - 1pm and is closed on Sundays and public holidays. There is limited space in the capsule so entries will be accepted on a first come first served basis. Maximum size of any item is 30cm (L) x20cm (W) x 10cm (D) cm and have a maximum weight of 250g.
