## **FROM THE HEADTEACHER**

It is great to be back and have a full term ahead of us. We are hoping to get out and about more this term as restrictions ease. For the moment, we are still operating the bubbles and the reassurance of regular staff testing is welcome. During the Easter break, I had my first vaccination and other members of staff are having theirs.

This week, the children in KS2 started the week with an exciting opportunity to test their attitude to fear and challenge. We were able to take advantage of the reasonable weather and have a great activity outside.

They had a BMX academy workshop with Mike Mullins, a former world champion BMX rider who started the day with an assembly in the morning including showing some stunts.

One of them included jumping over a ramp with two teachers lying down at the end of it.



All of the children learned new tricks. The tricks included the 'can can', where they kick their legs out to the side, jumps over ramps, 'no hands' and standing up on the frame. All of the children learned something about their own reactions and about the value of



keeping that "I can" door open and having a go. So many of them really surprised themselves and were proud of their achievements.

#### **School Plan Work**

The teachers have been looking at books across the school. It is important that the work that the children

produce in all subjects shows high expectations and children doing their best. We have seen this week that throughtout the school the work in RE and topic books is usually well presented, demonstrates the support for those that need it and the challenge for those able to work at a deeper level and progress over time is clear. We will be nagging those children who cross mistakes out untidily and insisting that they do so with a ruler. We know that mistakes are a key aspect of learning but need the children to be aware of the impact on the presentation. He talked about his own experiences and how we all respond to new and challenging situations.



He explained that often when faced with something difficult our "I can't" door opens and we soon find ourselves giving up. During the day he worked with Emerald and Diamond classes. He taught them some tricks and took them through a series of challenges. Everyone was included and those who were not confident cyclists were able to start without pedals, using the bike like a balance bike, then have the pedals added as their control and confidence increased. This worked really well.

Mike taught the rest a number of stunts. As he introduced each stunt, he asked them to think about their initial reaction and to identify whether their "I can "or "I can't" door had opened. He then showed them step by step how to do the trick and gave them a chance to do so.



**Y5 Maths Challenge** Yesterday, a group of Year 5 children took part in a countywide maths challenge after school. They had to solve some very challenging problems, estimation questions

and complete a memory round. I was so impressed with the way they worked together under the pressure of tight time limits and despite initial nerves, they seemed to really enjoy themselves. A huge well done to our team.

The teachers have also been writing the children's reports that will be coming out to you within the next couple of weeks.

Keep up with the latest social distancing rules and have a lovely weekend.






## **MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH**

It was with great sadness that we learnt, last Friday, of the death of HRH The Prince Philip, Duke of Edinburgh. Having been a pillar of our society, country and commonwealth for the past seven decades, the words 'duty' and 'service' have leapt out at us from all the media coverage of his passing, and the words of the Queen herself have frequently been replayed from a speech she gave in 1997, marking their golden wedding anniversary. Prince Philip, she said, "has, quite simply, been my strength and stay all these years, and I, and his whole family, and this and many other countries, owe him a debt greater than he would ever claim, or we shall ever know."

We have been buying new titles throughout the year so there are lots of exciting new books to discover, as well as classic favourites. We have switched off our Ready Reads pre-ordering service and instead families can, if they wish, pick up Grab and Go packs of pre-selected picture or board books and packs for adults too.

Children enjoy choosing their own books and they get to explore a huge range of quality titles that they would not find elsewhere. The great thing about the library is that they can try out new authors and genres and as they are borrowing books rather than buying them it does not matter if they decide they don't like a story, it can just be swapped for a new one on their next visit, all for free.

# Your child could get a Free School Meal (FSM)

# Your child could be eligible for a FSM if you satisfy the qualifying benefit criteria

## Why apply for a FSM?

- Your child will receive a healthy nutritional meal
- It will not cost you a penny
- Applying is quick and easy

### How do I Apply?

#### Apply by visiting

<u>www.hertfordshire.gov.uk/freeschoolmeals</u> and selecting the following tab. (You will need your National Insurance Number or Home Office number to hand).

#### Qualifying Benefits for FSM

- Income Support
- Income based Jobseekers allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The Guaranteed element of State Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (as long as you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and you don't get more than £16,190 a year)
- Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit (with annual earned income of no more than £7,400 a year after tax and not including any benefits you get). This includes those who had free school meals whilst on Universal Credit before April 1st 2018 even if earnings are above that £7400 figure.

If your child is eligible for free school meals, they'll remain eligible until March 2023, or until they finish their current phase of schooling (primary or secondary), if that's after March 2023.

# Apply for free school meals (Year 3 and older) >

#### Did you know?

Registering for a FSM helps schools identify anyone on low income; the school can then claim additional funding from the government, which can help towards extra computers, books, trips out and staff etc.
