FROM THE HEADTEACHER




Carnival Dance: This week as part of our Black History Month focus, the children enjoyed Carnival dance lessons. Elisangela (Eli), from Brazil, looked fabulous in her carnival costume and the children loved the headdress and feathers. They were also inspired by her enthusiasm and energy. Each class had a lesson and the dances became increasingly complex and demanding as the ages of the children increased. All of the lessons were extremely energetic. One child commented straight after the warm up that she was already tired and they hadn't even started the proper lesson. After 45 minutes, even the fittest of the children were ready for a break.

They learned a range of moves and had to keep up with the fast paced music. Lessons built towards the finale; a dance off, where, split into two groups, they faced each other and challenged each other to dance their most impressive moves. They really got into the spirit of it.

We could see by the focus and concentration and the great smiles on their faces, how much the children loved the dance. From the youngest to the oldest they had a great experience.

School improvement focus: This week the teachers have been reviewing the progress made by the children in maths. In September, we moved to a different scheme of work. This is produced by White Rose, a group of maths teaching specialists that have been developing the mastery approach in the UK for the last eight years. We found their resources very helpful during the pandemic and now that they have started producing a full set of teaching and learning resources, we have moved away from Power Maths. The teachers can see how well the children are responding and a number of them have said that they are finding the layout and sequence of work really clear, enabling them to be successful with challenging work.





Our involvement in the Yellow Book: The Yellow Book is the creative, wellbeing resource published by *rethinkyourmind*; created by those with experience of mental health challenges and endorsed by professionals; the book hopes to support, inspire and signpost. So, in their 10th year, on the 10th day of the 10th month, they begin the FIRST EVER Primary School Yellow Book - on World Mental Health Day!

Rethink Your Mind. We will have an assembly next week to begin our involvement in this great project and to launch an art competition in

school in order to produce and select entries.

Well Being Review: Hertfordshire County Council have a duty to review their schools on a regular basis across a whole range of areas. This year the focus for us has been on what we are doing to support the wellbeing of the pupils. This is obviously a key topic and one that it is in the front of our minds. The review included looking at plans, strategies, newsletters, curriculum maps and pupil's work. Most importantly, it included talking to children. One group were tasked with taking the visitors on a tour of the school and telling them about the school. Other groups met the reviewers and answered questions about how they feel about school and what measures are in place to support their wellbeing. I want to say a huge well done to all of the children who took part as they certainly did us proud. They were confident, articulate and enthusiastic about our school and their learning. They talked about ways that they are supported and emphasised how much they feel part of the school. This was lovely to hear about. They also said that they would love to do more of their learning outside and have more time to take advantage of our outdoor spaces, and we have already started to do this and to plan ways for an increase. We shall receive a written report in the next few weeks, but the verbal comments made me very proud.

Congratulations to Mrs Smith for passing the National Award for SEN Coordination. Completing such a demanding and high status course, whilst starting the role as SENCO and continuing as a full time class teacher is a fantastic achievement. We are very proud of her.

MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH



Father Simon writes:

No doubt all you twitchers out there are scanning the telephone wires and trees with particular interest at the moment. That's because, for bird watchers, we're right in the middle of the autumn migration season.



Apparently over 550 different species of bird have been spotted in the wild in Britain. But that's only a small percentage of the 10,000 or so different kinds of bird in the world. It is, though, a similar number (about 530) to that found in the Holy Land. No wonder birds get a frequent mention in the Bible.

The first specific bird to be mentioned in the Bible is the raven, released by Noah from the ark in an attempt to find dry land. Noah then sent out a dove - that symbol of peace which, for Christians, is also a symbol of the Holy Spirit which, at his baptism in the river Jordan came down upon Jesus 'like a dove'.





Back in the Old Testament, a stork, an ostrich, and an eagle are all mentioned in the book of Job, while quail were food for the Israelites in the desert. The prophet Elijah, meanwhile, was fed by ravens, and the book of Proverbs refers to sparrows chirping on rooftops.

Talking of the noise of birds, I'm sure many of us know the story of St Peter's denial of Jesus. Just as Jesus had foretold, Peter's third denial that he even knew Jesus was followed by the fateful sound of a cock crowing.



On a more positive note, the flight of an eagle reminds us of freedom and the renewal of strength, with the psalmist using its wings as a symbol for the protection of God in times of trouble. Indeed, Isaiah talks about a bird hovering over its nest to protect its young to describe God's protection of Jerusalem. Building on that imagery, Jesus yearned to gather the people of Jerusalem to him as a hen gathers her chicks under her wings.

Jesus also compared us with sparrows: "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? Yet not one of them will fall to the ground unperceived by your Father. And even the hairs of your head are all counted." (Matthew 10:29-30) Jesus wants us to know that each one of us is significant and precious to God.



How often do we overlook the good things of life? How often do we miss the small, simple things of life - such as the birds - which bring joy and interest to so many? No matter what's going on in the world or in our lives, there's still so much for which to be grateful.



The quiz is part of a campaign run during October and November, in partnership with local councils and the Fire and Rescue Service, to deter anti-social behaviour and make sure everyone has a safe and enjoyable time.

If children (and parents) are planning to go trick or treating, we ask that you consider the following advice to help you stay safe and not cause distress to others:

- Never go trick or treating alone and always take an adult with you.
- Don't knock on the doors of strangers
- Only visit houses where there are signs that trick or treaters are welcome, such as Halloween decorations and pumpkins outside.
- Keep your Halloween 'tricks' safe damage to property or hurting someone is a crime. Threatening and abusive behaviour can amount to an offence too.
- Remember road safety rules, particularly after dark.
- Wear something bright so that drivers can see you.
- If you are planning on hosting your own firework party make sure you tell all your neighbours, especially those with pets which may be affected by the noise.

General electrical product safety

- 1. Make sure you've checked for recalls and registered your appliance.
- 2. Make sure an electrical appliance has a British or European safety mark.
- 3. Don't leave appliance unattended with young children and/or animals.
- 4. Turn heaters off before bed and when not in the room.
- 5. Follow the manufacturers operating and maintenance instructions
- 6. Do not power device from extension lead, use wall sockets only



Tips to use electric blankets safely

- Store electric blankets flat, rolled up or loosely folded to prevent damaging the internal wiring.
- 2. Unplug blankets before you get into bed, unless it has a thermostat control for safe
- Never use an electric blanket if you have an air flow pressure relief mattress, non-flammable alternatives instead.
- If your blanket gets wet, don't use it and never switch it on to dry it.
- 5. Do not buy second-hand electric
- Check regularly for wear and tear and replace at least every 10 years.



Tips to use portable heaters safely

- 1. Make sure heaters are maintained and in good working order
- Don't take risks with old heaters get it tested by a qualified electrician or buy a new one.
- 3. Where appropriate, secure heaters against a wall to stop them falling over, or fit wall-mounted heaters.
- Keep heaters well away from clothes, curtains and furniture and never use them for drying clothes. Emollient users are at
- Always sit at least one metre away from a heater as it could set light to your clothes or chair
- 6. Before attempting to move your heater,
- 7. Only use gas or paraffin heaters in well-ventilated areas. Heaters consume oxygen so you could suffocate if a room is not properly aired.
