FROM THE HEADTEACHER

This week, Ruby class have continued to use the outdoors to develop their understanding of living things. They are learning the names and functions of a plant. They talked about a plants roots, stem, leaves, and flower (and petals). They looked carefully, using magnifiers, at plants on our grounds and identified the different parts. Then, back inside, they organised a plant diagram and then helped label a plant using an app on the laptops.



Emerald class have been learning about sound. They have learned about volume and pitch. A couple of the children spoke to me about the lesson and explained their understanding. I was told that volume is about quiet and loud sounds. The children had experimented with a range of instruments, making sounds that were quiet and loud. Lots of fun was had making very loud sounds and care was taken to make the quieter ones. Pitch is when the sounds are low or high and the children had used different instruments and found out ways to change the pitch. The guitar was very popular and the concentration shows in the pictures. The children could feel the vibrations in the strings or on the drums and they looked at images of sound waves.

They will also be using an app on the tablet to see how sound waves change according to the pitch and volume.



Diamond Class had a visit to the Royal Gunpowder Mills as part of their History topic, the Victorians. I asked for some information from the school journalist Finley M and heard some interesting facts about the day. The class met a character from that time, Henry Gaunt (an actor in costume), who told them all about the lives of ordinary people who worked at the mills during the Victorian Era; about their work, their leisure and their schooling. The children were shown and allowed to examine artefacts such as the one-legged stools that supervisors at the gunpowder mill sat

on during their 14 hours shifts to ensure they stayed awake and alert at all times. Marlon particularly liked the artefacts. The children used tablets to access activities. One of which was creating gunpowder and being ready to react if it started to become dangerous and another was about the clothing. Apparently workers were not allowed to wear hob-nailed boots -the go to footwear of the day -, as they could produce sparks. Workers were also checked to make sure they were not carrying matches or anything else that could start a fire. They explored the grounds and looked at the buildings (the part of the day that Taliya particularly enjoyed). They found out about the technology of the time such as the fire alarm system on the site that sent an electromagnetic signal



to operators who had to decode it to identify where the emergency was, and the Victorian alternatives to washing machines, taking turns to try the different laundry methods and discovering for themselves how much hard work it would have been. A very instructive day to help deepen their understanding of the life of the Victorians.



Meanwhile, Father Simon and Di joined us on Wednesday afternoon to lead an Ash Wednesday service. Our current Christian Value is forgiveness and we found out more about Lent in the Church calendar and how Christians use this time to prepare for Easter. Children and staff were able to take part and receive the sign of the cross in ash on their forehead or hand. The level of understanding the children demonstrate and the respect and thoughtfulness that they show never fails to impress me.

Strike Day: School will remain open for Diamond and Sapphire class. Sapphire Class will be going ahead with their swimming lesson. Children in Diamond and Sapphire will be expected to attend school at the usual time. In addition, we are

making provision for pupils who are eligible for pupil premium and for those with a high level of SEND to be in school for the day, and if your child falls within this category and they are coming into school, please let the office know so that we can make plans.

Diamond Class Trip to the Royal Gunpowder Mills

MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH



Father Simon writes:

Some of you may recall me reflecting late last year in the *Sawbridgeworth Flyer* on Bronnie Ware's book 'The Top Five Regrets of the Dying'.



Bronnie is an Australian who, in her early years, found herself working in palliative

care. Having got to know well those she cared for, she was struck by their

common regrets as they neared the end of life. And from those regrets Bronnie produced a book featuring the advice to:



- 1. Live a life which is true to you, and not the life others might wish you to lead.
- 2. Don't work so hard to the exclusion of the simple, beautiful things of life.
- 3. Sensitively express your feelings; don't let things go unsaid.
- 4. Stay in touch with your friends.
- 5. Be happy and content with things now, else happiness will never arrive in your life.

Bronnie's book touches upon that sense of mortality which we're all faced with at times, and it reminds us that this one life is not only precious but that we should take responsibility to focus on what really matters, rather than all the other stuff which

consciously or unconsciously distracts us.

It was great to be in school this past Ash Wednesday to share the beginning of Lent with the children. As our Lenten journey continues over the next 40 or so days, perhaps the sentiments of Bronnie's book are a good starting point, leading us to ask: What do I need to do to make the most of my one precious life?



That may raise a host of other questions: What do I value most in my life? What is it that I'm consciously doing to distract myself from living my life to the fullest? What is

it that I could clear out of my life which is currently unconsciously encroaching on it and devaluing it? The result might be a very constructive Lenten journey. After all, our precious lives should be of infinite value in our eyes because they're certainly of infinite value in God's eyes.




