This week has been an interesting one with the weather having quite an impact. Well done to everyone for making it into school despite the lake outside and regardless of the inconsiderate road users. We will not record late arrival due to the traffic as lateness.

Ruby Class had an opportunity to experience the wind together – they went outside to explore running about in it. They picked up leaves and watched how, when they let it go, the wind took the leaf. Sometimes it travelled a long way and sometimes just swirled around. This week, they have also used the laptops to create some fantastic firework pictures. (see above). Ruby class have just begun joining the rest of the school for play at lunchtimes and in order to provide support for them, they



have buddies from Diamond Class. The buddies love having this responsibility and the younger ones benefit from being looked after and played with by an older child.








Sapphire Class have started their coding work in computing. They learn about algorithms and that these are sets of instructions that build up to complex actions. They have been using the Beebots to explore how instructions are input into this particular device and how these instructions can make the Beebots move in different ways.



Whole School: Values: We have started exploring our new value, Trust. We have thought about how our friends support us. Some of the children were keen to put on a blindfold and trust that their friend would see them safely around the playground. We shall be exploring what is means to earn another's trust and be trustworthy.





Ruby Class (R & N) explored the work of **Lubaina Himid** and found out that her paintings are about friendship and strength. They then created their own collages inspired by her work.







Sapphire (Y1 & Y2) class found out about the artist **Alma Thomas** and the way that she uses bright strong colours in her work to represent nature. They then produced their own abstract paintings in her style.








Emerald (Y3 & 4) class explored the works of **Stephen Wiltshire**, who is most famous for drawing detailed cityscapes from memory. They then used pencils to create their own Stephen Wiltshire inspired cityscapes of London.





Diamond (Y5 & Y6) class found out about the artwork of **Rachel Jones** and how she uses pastels and oil sticks to explore colours and how they are connected to our feelings. They then used pastels and different blending techniques to produce their own abstract pictures.



Maths Homework: For any parents that want some assistance with the maths homework, please pop in with your child after school on Wednesday where we will be glad to assist and explain.



MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH

Father Simon writes:

As we begin the second half of the term, we also begin a new Collective Worship value in school. As we head towards Christmas (yes – it won't be long now!), we're going to be focussing on 'Trust'.



And it coincides with the beginning of the Church's season of remembrance. But I'm not only thinking about the remembrance of all those killed and injured in our nation's wars and conflicts. This Sunday at 9.30am we're going to be celebrating not only the Feast of All Saints - that day when the global Church gives thanks for the lives of the thousands of men and women who, over two millennia, have lived lives of great faith, and who, in many cases, were killed because of their beliefs – but also, at 3pm, the Feast of All Souls when we'll be remembering our own departed loved ones: all those whose lives aren't necessarily recorded in the history books but whose memory we continue to cherish and whose loss we still tearfully grieve.

It's only on Saturday 11th that we'll begin our commemoration of what many think of as 'Remembrance', with a two-minute silence at 11am at the town's war memorial in the churchyard on both Armistice Day (Saturday 11th) and Remembrance Sunday (12th), followed at 3pm on Remembrance Sunday by our town's Civic Service of Remembrance.

We'll be touching on many themes and values over the next few weeks during these remembrance moments. But, at the heart of it, for Christians, is 'trust'. Trust that, whether we've died on the battlefield or whilst on the more mundane walk of life, death is not the end. That's not to say that Christians don't fear death. The process of dying brings us all a certain level of apprehension, if not very real fear - a fear which even Jesus himself experienced whilst praying in the Garden of Gethsemane before his execution.





But our trust that there's something

beyond this mortal coil gives us the opportunity to be thankful. Thankful not only for the lives of those we've known but see no longer and thankful for those who've sacrificed their lives for the benefit of all those of us who come after them, but the opportunity for us all to live grateful, sacrificial lives for the benefit of all and our community.


