

Placing our Poppies

FROM THE HEADTEACHER

This week, we have been preparing for Remembrance Day. The children have learned more about poppies and how the materials used for poppies has changed over time from cotton in the 1920's, to plastic in the 80's and now to plastic-free.



One of the children in Ruby class chose to paint this lovely picture of a poppy during her Child Initiated Learning time.


Each class has made poppies using a different technique and these are also plastic free. The children showed their respect during a short Remembrance service and observed the minutes silence impeccably. They then walked silently outside to lay their poppies in the school meadow reflection area.





We have recently received a class set of Micro:bit coding devices and this week the children in Diamond Class had their first opportunity to use them. Looking into the history of these tiny computers has been a journey into my own computing past. It has been developed by BBC's Computer Literacy Project, who first introduced the pioneering BBC Micro into schools in the 1980s. I recall the BBC Micro as the machine I first used to start coding and using these, I completed both my Computer Science O-level and A-level (with

quite a lot of frustration at times due to their lack of reliability). Computers have come such a long way from those early machines whose display was a very large monitor with a noisy cassette recorder





for data storage. The principles of coding and the fundamentals of algorithm design remain the same today.

The Micro:bit has been developed over the last decade with projects around the world. The Foundation who are leading the development have the goal to reach more than 100 million children worldwide. Version 2 is now

being distributed free to schools across England.

The Micro:bit is simple to simple to use, and yet, it's also engaging across a range of ages. The distributors aim is to inspire young people to understand and create with technology, not simply consume it. At Spellbrook, we share that aim and have just started our learning journey with the Micro:bit. The children use a laptop to access a web-based app, where they design code and test it out on a simulator. They then link their Micro:bit to the laptop and download the algorithm to make it operate.



This week, the children in Diamond class created name badges with their name scrolling across the LEDs. As the app is intuitive and similar to other coding apps they have used, they quickly mastered this and many went on to add additional messages, simple graphics and even sound effects. Again, that took me back to the artificial (and slightly annoying) sounds of the first consoles and early computers that I had enjoyed using as a child.





Judging by the enthusiasm and enjoyment of the first lesson, I am optimistic that the children will gain a lot from our project and have the opportunity to develop their skills and create many projects.

MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH

Father Simon writes:

This coming Sunday, millions will gather together around the world in remembrance of those who died in two world wars, and those who have died in many other conflicts since – just as the school gathered today. With so much war and hostility in the news at the moment,



no doubt those being killed and injured in conflicts around the world this very day will also be in people's minds.



As we remember the sacrifice made by so many, we must realise we don't come to glorify war but to recognise its cost; the many human lives lost and

the suffering caused to all involved and affected by war.



Many on Sunday will gather at 3pm at the War Memorial here in Great St Mary's churchyard including the uniformed organisations - where a short

act of remembrance will take place to remember those killed in action or those innocent victims who were so many miles away from the front line. There we'll hold the Two-Minute Silence before laying wreaths. This act of remembrance will be followed by a short service



in church during which we'll come together to re-commit ourselves before God to be peacemakers. It's something Jesus asks all his disciples to become through the way we live our lives. We'll express our common humanity shared by pausing to recognise the true value of every life - both past and present.

Something which has been in the headlines recently is the nature of 'peace'. The Christian understanding of peace is more than the avoidance of war and more than the absence of conflict. It's about building



relationships between people, communities, and nations. It's something seen after the Second World War when the people of Coventry, led by its cathedral community worshipping in the bombed ruins of its building, acknowledged not only the devastation brought upon our own country by the Nazis but the devastation inflicted by us on cities such as Dresden. In the wake of that, new relationships of peace and reconciliation were forged.

Each Monday, at the end of our collective worships, we all make a pledge for the week ahead. It's the school's Bible verse from St Matthew's gospel (Matthew 7:12), known as The Golden Rule: 'In everything - in every circumstance - do to others as you would have them do to you.' As we remember the sacrifice of so many this weekend and reflect on how we might improve this world and our relationships, may the sentiments of this verse be our guiding light.


