FROM THE HEADTEACHER

Two particularly exciting but contrasting events have taken place this week. One took place in school, bringing in resources and expertise to give the children a rich experience in the comfort of our own building, therefore reducing the need to travel with the associated costs and environmental impact and the other was a very long day with lots of travelling and a late finish, but this event enabled the children to be part of something truly memorable and enjoyable.

The Roman Experience Day for Emerald Class







Emerald Class enjoyed a Roman Experience Day provided by Off the Page, a history workshop provider. Patrick (dressed as a Roman) brought a great deal of resources and an impressive amount of knowledge of Roman Britain into school and led the children through a day that involved making lots of Roman items, whilst stopping regularly to find out more about that period, practising shield formations, putting on Roman plays then enjoying a Roman feast.

The Roman crafts were varied and involved lots of different skills and provided an insight into the lives of people at that time in Britain. The children were able to take all of the items home. Some of the children told me what the activities were, and what they had learned. The activities included making:


- a small mosaic out of tesserae (tiles). Mosaics could be lots of different designs and would decorate your villa. This would show that you were wealthy.
- a leather (ish) pouch, called a Bulla. They were worn by children until they became adults or got married and had special protective items inside.
- a wax tablet. If you were lucky enough to go to school you would write on them, and the wax could be heated and melted so you could start again.
- a signalacum. This is a piece of metal that was carried around to identify you as a soldier in the army and it would say something like Legio IX. Rich people had similar necklaces that could have any design they were made of bronze or copper.

- perfume. Berries, herbs and spices were crushed then olive oil was added to make a perfume that could be used to put on to cleanse them and make them smell nice. This was a favourite item of many of the children and one told me that she had given some to her sister and some to her mum.
- a board game, called Rota. After they had made the game, the children played it. You had to get three stones in a row to win.

The children also enjoyed retelling how they had enjoyed finding answers to questions such as "what happened to the ninth legion?", and "did Boudicca have spies in the Roman camps?", and sharing their fascination with what they had learned about Roman hygiene and toileting, (including all the unpleasant details), how they had loved the shield practise, including making the Tortoise formation and how they had enjoyed performing plays, like the Romans would have done in their theatres, as well as having a feast to end the day.

As the children continue their topic on Romans, they will be able to build on the knowledge and experiences of this day, making their learning more meaningful and memorable. Thank you to the parent helpers and staff for their hard work and support.

They also had the world's biggest dance battle between the parents and kids to a 90's Pop Medley and a massive Mexican wave spread around the entire arena.

were also breathtaking light shows that dazzled the audience and the choir. There was a live band: a bass, guitar, percussion instruments, keyboards and drums. In the rock medley, Nandi (who has played drums for the Foo Fighters) drummed all the way through. The big finale got all the guests to sing, River Deep, Mountain High with Nandi now playing the saxophone.

The Children's Commissioner report on Children's Views on Video Gaming is a very interesting report with some key findings, for example:

- Around two thirds of children say that games are beneficial to mental health and wellbeing.
- There is pressure to have better gaming equipment
- Concerns over paid loot boxes.
- Frustrations at adults not recognising the positives of gaming.



MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH

Father Simon writes:

Well, whilst the Christmas season may well have been packed away, along with all the baubles and tinsel, shortly after New Year, the Church's celebrations continue up until the beginning of February.



often (wrongly) thought of as three kings - didn't occur for a good while - perhaps as much as three years

The Church therefore celebrates the arrival of the wise men separately, in early January. And this separate moment - which we call the Feast of Epiphany - turns into a Church season which is actually longer than Christmas... up, as I say, to the beginning of February.



Why? Well, to have a moment of 'epiphany' is to have a moment of revelation. Whilst it's always presumed that the local shepherds were Jewish (the same religion as Jesus), the magi, who, led by a star, travelled from the east, were gentiles - just like the majority of us in this country. Therefore, the moment Jesus is 'revealed' to the wise men is the moment Jesus is 'revealed' by God to the wider world - including us. It's the moment in the Bible that it's made clear that, whilst we may have to travel a great distance in mind and heart, Jesus isn't just a revelation for Jews but also for gentiles.

Therefore, whilst we officially celebrate Christmas in church for roughly the same length of time as our wider (secular) world, we celebrate Epiphany for longer - hearing in church various Bible stories which 'reveal' to us the reality of Jesus - because of its importance to our faith and belief in Jesus as the Son of God.

And so it's in that spirit that this Sunday, in our first *Mustard Seed* gathering of the new year (*Mustard Seed* gathers in church at 4pm on most third Sundays of the month), we're going to be doing crafts celebrating this Epiphany season, and reflecting how God continues to reveal Himself to us in our lives. And that's all followed by a party tea, so that there's no need for parents and carers to have to worry about feeding children before bedtime. I hope you'll consider joining us - it's always good fun.
