FROM THE HEADTEACHER

After a lovely Easter Break, it is great to be back to start the summer term. Our new value is 'Service' and we have just started to explore what this means. This is a very interesting value to explore, particularly in a time when society and the media often promote self and selfishness and undervalue the personal and community benefits of supporting others. We have reminded the children that as a school we wish to perform a very worthwhile and impactful service by raising funds for children who are supported by the Shiksha Rath Organisation in India. I understand that many of our children have already asked for sponsors, and it would be great to raise enough to sponsor at least one child for a year. The sponsored walk will take place in school time on Wednesday 1st May 2024. If you have any questions, please get in touch.

Hip Hop Dance: This week the children in Ruby and Sapphire classes enjoyed hip-hop dance sessions with an external provider from the company that provide our PE sports coaching. The children learned five different moves that they practised in a sequence. They then developed their own moves by combining the taught ones or experimenting with their own. They added five of these to the original sequence to create a full routine. They really enjoyed themselves and achieved really well as individuals and as a group.

Tag Rugby: All of Emerald Class have been out to a rugby event at Bishop's Stortford Rugby Club. For some of the children this is the first of these events that they have participated in, so they were a bit nervous. They have been practising tag rugby in their PE lessons, so it was a great chance to take part in games with children from other local schools. Our children were in three teams and each team had Year 3 and Year 4s and a mix of boys and girls. After



a training session led by some of the secondary school sports leaders, the children had four or five matches each. Each of the teams got stuck in and some children enjoyed taking other's tags as much as they enjoyed handling the ball. Even those who had been nervous let the excitement take over and with the lovely weather, it was a fun afternoon for the whole class.



Sapphire Class: As part of their English, Sapphire class's current topic is based on the picture book," The Day the Crayons Quit". They will be studying the text from parts of the book and using it to develop their own ideas. The children have realised that there are no felt tip pens in their classroom at the moment and Mrs McDonald read them a letter from the felt-tip pens explaining why they are unhappy and have quit the classroom.

The children will be writing their own persuasive pieces, about the Day the Felt-tip Pens Quit. They will be writing to the pens to persuade them to come back and will be explaining what they will do to make the pens feel looked after and cared for. If it helps them to remember to put lids on the pens, at the same as developing their writing then their teacher and I will be more than pleased.



Classroom Improvements: I am really pleased that we are able to compliment the fantastic work by the staff by continuing to improve and upgrade the physical learning environment. Ruby and Sapphire Class have just had recent makeovers. We have new flooring that looks amazing and will hopefully be easier to clean, new carpets and new blinds. Our plan to focus on the other classrooms and then later on to focus on the shared areas.



Car Park: I am sure you I will have noticed the new lines and marking. Please do not park on the double yellow lines. I am aware that the car park gets very busy. We have more pupils in our school than ever before (to my knowledge), and this means more vehicles. To help manage the number of vehicles on site, please:

MESSAGE FROM GREAT ST MARY'S CHURCH

Father Simon writes:



Well, the Easter eggs may well have all been eaten by now but, as far as the Church is concerned, we're still celebrating the good news of Jesus' Easter resurrection, reading the accounts of that earth-shattering day and once again reminding ourselves of its repercussions for our lives. (Like Christmas, the Church doesn't celebrate



Easter in the run up to the big day but for several weeks afterwards.)

And one aspect of Jesus' teaching which we're continuing to bear in mind is based on something that happened on the night before his death. Jesus was in Jerusalem eating a Passover meal with the closest of his friends - a meal which we would come to know as the Last Supper - and, at one point, he insisted on washing his disciples' feet.



In the dusty days of the Roman Middle East, this was a common practice - not least to show hospitality to guests. But the dirty action was usually carried out by a householder's slave. On this occasion though, Jesus himself insisted on doing it, much to the astonishment of Jesus' friends.

Jesus then spoke to them to explain his actions. "You call me Teacher and Lord - and you are right, for that is what I am. So, if I, your Lord and Teacher, have

washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you." [John 13:13-15]

Of course, Jesus' teaching doesn't just refer to the practice of foot-washing. He was vividly illustrating the way in which, throughout life, nobody should lord it over anybody else.

It was a story and teaching that we explored on Monday when I popped into school to take the first collective worship of the new term. It was great to see everybody and to crack open the new school value for this half of term; as you might have realised, that theme is 'service'. We also noted that Jesus' teaching completely resonates with our school Bible verse: "In everything - in every circumstance - do to others as you would have them do to you." [Matthew 7:12]





Over the coming weeks, I'm looking forward to exploring the theme of 'service' more with the children. Though, be warned: judging by my experience as a parent, I can't promise you that it'll lead to an increase in the levels of service you experience around the home from your children. But this Eastertide, we can all hope and pray for miracles!!
